

## MAPLE LEAF POINT SYSTEM

A new scoring system for the Maple Leaf Trophy was introduced at the 1971 Royal Canadian Henley Regatta. Designed by T. E. Norris of Toronto, a past-president and past-treasurer of the Canadian Association of Amateur Oarsmen, the system is graduated on the basis of boat categories, doing away with extra points for premier events and eliminating percentage awards from heats.

## Jack S. Guest 1906 - 1972

Rowing suffered irrepairable loss June 12, 1972, in the death of Jack S. Guest, one of three Canadians to win the Diamond Sculls. He was 66 years of age at the time of his passing following a lengthy battle with cancer.

A former president of the Canadian Association of Amateur Oarsmen, Jack Guest was the North American continental representative to the International Rowing Federation (FISA), the first Canadian to hold this position in the governing body of world rowing. He was also a director of the Canadian Olympic Association and a member of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada Hall of Fame.

Jack Guest began sculling in 1924 with the old Toronto Dons. Three years later, he won the junior and association singles at the Royal Canadian Henley Regatta here and then combined the following summer with Joe Wright Jr. of Toronto Argonauts for a silver medal in the double sculls at the Amsterdam Olympics.

In 1929, Jack Guest won the championship single at the Henley here and followed it in 1930 with the Diamonds at the Henley

Royal Regatta in England.

Following his retirement from active competition, Jack Guest remained with rowing in an executive position. He rose through the executive ranks of the CAAO to become president for a two-year term 1955-56; managed Canadian rowing teams at the 1954 Commonwealth Games in Vancouver and the 1956 Olympic Games in Melbourne; was assistant chef de mission of the Commonwealth contingent in 1962 at Perth and 1966 for Jamaica; served as president of the Don Rowing Club; was financial chairman for the 1967 North American Rowing Championships; acted as senior advisor to the CAAO executive committee; and was appointed to his FISA post in 1969.

In addition, Jack Guest coached his two sons, Jack Jr. and Donald, in sculling to where they became tops in their field during the early 1950's. They survive, along with his wife, the former

Mary Macdonald of St. Catharines.

Jack Guest may have gained much from rowing, but he put back far more into the sport which was always his first love. His enthusiastic outlook, his affable ways and his wise counsel will be sadly missed by those who remain.

## Argonaut Rowing

100 YEARS

It was 100 years ago that Toronto Argonauts first appeared on the Canadian rowing scene. But the organization's posh Lake Shore Blvd. headquarters with its stable of sleek racing shells bears little resemblance to the rented shed at the foot of George St. where the Double blue began on June 22, 1872.

Toronto Argonauts have come a long way in their first century, from an obscure beginning as a refuge for non-drinking oarsmen to what for many years was Canada's No. 1 rowing club. And even though Argos are better known today as a gang of professional footballers, the crews and scullers in striped Double Blue singlets are still winning their share of rowing races.

The two blues were chosen to represent both Oxford and Cambridge, in 1872 to acknowledged leaders of the rowing world. Nineteen years later, they adopted the motto: Pull Together. That and the familiar Argo sailing ship have been synonimous with the oarsmen and footballers ever since.

Toronto Argonauts, until recent years, dominated Canadian domestic and international rowing. Perennial champions of the Royal Canadian Henley Regatta, the Double Blue loaded Canadian Olympic teams from 1904 through 1952. Their eights made regular forays to the English Henley. They were the first Canadian rowing club to bring home the Julius Barnes Trophy, emblematic of the U.S. Nationals points title, winning it in 1927 at Wyandotte, Mich.

But through all the years, Argos' most famous names have been

O'Brien and Wright.

Henry O'Brien helped found the club in 1872 and served as president for the first 16 years of its existence. He rowed in all of the great Argonaut crews of those early years and continued with recreational rowing regularly until his death at the age of 96 years.

Joe Wright, Sr., Canada's oarsman of the first half century, earned his first Argo gold medal at the age of 13 and won his last race at 51 as stroke of a crew which won the senior four at the Henley here. In between, he was in 137 championship boats, 12 of them earning U.S. national titles.


And throughout much of this period, Joe Wright Sr. was also coaching Argo oarsmen and sculler — among them his son, George, a member of the 1908 Argo Olympic eight. Later, of course, he handled another son, Joe Jr., to the 1928 Diamond Sculls and a silver medal with Jack Guest of Toronto Dons in the double at the Amsterdam Olympics.

Joe Wright Sr. left Argos in 1916 to coach at the University of Pennsylvania with even greater success. And when he returned to Toronto in 1927, a grateful Argonaut membership elected him president,

a post he held until 1934.

## THE CALDER CLELAND MEMORIAL TROPHY

### FOR ANNUAL INTERNATIONAL HIGH SCHOOL EIGHTS COMPETITION

at the

### ROYAL CANADIAN HENLEY REGATTA

The most valuable trophy in amateur sports today, the Calder Cleland Memorial Trophy is worth \$50,000 and yet virtually irreplaceable, a gold and silver wine jug which was the gift of the Goldsmiths and Silversmiths Guild of England to the Princess Eugenie upon her marriage to Emperor Napoleon III of France in 1853.

The trophy was donated to rowing in 1945 by the Cleland family of St. Catharines in memory of Pilot Officer Calder Cleland of the Royal Canadian Air Force, killed in action July 3, 1943, over Sicily.


On that basis, the Old Boys have certainly won their spurs. Ever since their inception in 1957 they have been performing praiseworthy deeds. That's for sure!



## THE FUTURE!

## AND THE FIVE-YEAR PLAN . . .

It was not too many years ago that Canada's international rowing program consisted of an emergence from the woodwork every four years to boat a collection of crews for Olympic Games.

A few turned out well. Most were something less than acceptable. Yet Canada's showing in these Olympic regattas was amazingly good, mostly through the efforts of British Columbia boats which have won

two golds and two silvers since 1956.

Still, Canada's over-all international rowing program remained, at best, a hit-and-miss affair. Only when an individual club or school mustered that rare combination of money and talent have our oarsmen

appeared in elite overseas competition.

All that has changed now though. Under a new five-year program introduced by the Canadian Association of Amateur Oarsmen in conjunction with Sport Canada, our most promising young oarsmen and scullers are getting the chance to row regularly against the best in a

variety of regattas the world over.

But they have to earn the right to wear Canadian colors in these elite overseas events, graduating from a comprehensive training plan complete with physical and physiological testing program designed to produce adequately-prepared athletes able to cope with the tremendously high calibre of competition found in European rowing. And only the fittest survive.

Under the direction of Dr. Martin Bielz, the former Romanian international who is the CAAO technical director, this 1972 Olympic and Youth training program involved some 200 oarsmen and scullers from 20 Canadian rowing clubs and schools at its outset. And while it has been designed specifically to boat crews for this week's FISA Youth Championships at Milan and the Munich Olympics, the scheme is also the initial part of this five-year plan to create a nucleus of elite competitors for the Montreal Olympics in 1976.

Already, the CAAO and Sport Canada have combined to send a 15-man team to the English Henley and Lucerne for international experience. That cox four win in the Prince Philip Challenge Cup at

Henley-on-Thames is proof the program can produce.

And now, with the 1972 Olympic Rowing Team chosen, the next step has been taken . . . not forgetting the teenagers who are rowing against the world's best at Milan this week. They are the base upon which the program must build.


It is a system which has worked well for East Germany, the acknowledged leaders in rowing, and the CAAO is confident it can

be made to work for Canada too.

Canadian rowing is embarking on new waters with its five-year international development plan, but it remains the only logical solution to improving our showing at Olympics, Pan-American Games and World Rowing Championships. Otherwise the rest of the rowing world will leave us hopelessly far behind.

Granted, the plan may not enjoy overnight success. The long row unwards will be tough. But at least it's a step in the right direction.


## DOUBLE HENLEY CHAMP
