





The Canadian Henley Rowing Corporation was formerly known as the Henley Aquatic Association. However, while taking over Henley Aquatic's responsibilities for maintaining and improving the Henley Course and its attendant facilities for the betterment of Canadian rowing, the CHRC also superceded the Henley Island Corporation and the 1970 World Rowing Championships Canada Corporation. In effect, the new organization, formed in 1973, consolidated all of St. Catharines' non-competitive rowing groups under one banner dedicated to the preservation of Canada's first Class A international standards rowing course, the site of the III World Rowing Championships in 1970 and all of Canada's major national regattas.



## GERRY LIENERT PORTRAIT OF A COACH



Gerry Lienert

Gerry Lienert is no stranger to Henley fans. As an oarsman and later a coach with the St. Catharines Rowing Club, he has appeared in many of them.

In fact, it was Gerry Lienert who was mainly responsible from moving St. Catharines into the realm of international rowing, his crews going to Olympics, Pan-American Games and World Championships with impressive regularity. And it was under the Port Dalhousie native that St. Catharines began its domination of the Henley and left a mark on U.S. domestic rowing.

Gerry Lienert, a marine engineer by profession, lives in Saint John, N.B., these days. But he hasn't turned his back on rowing. He's coaching the newly-formed Kennebecasis Rowing Club at nearby Renforth.

Obviously, the former St. Catharines head coach is making his mark down east too. Steve Belding, writing in the Saint John Evening Times-Globe, says it all:

Contrary to the general trend in sports, the Kennebecasis Rowing Club doesn't lack equipment — it lacks the personnel to take advantage of it.

The club started two years ago when Dr. C.H. Bonnycastle and other founders acquired an old racing shell from a Nova Scotia rowing club. Gerry Lienert, a new resident in the Renforth area, was then approached to handle the coaching duties of the proposed club.

Within two months after the initial steps, the club was formed and funds had been found to purchase the club's first four. Another was added during the second year of operation and two more pairs have been ordered. In all, that's about \$10,000 worth of equipment in two years.

Now, Gerry Lienert, a man with impressive coaching credentials who's keenly interested in the sport, wants to get the Kennebecasis Rowing Club rolling.

He says if he can find the right calibre of individual to work with, that "within a couple of years I can have him participating in international competition. But it depends on the individual."



#### our second FISA course

St. Catharines can proudly boast of having North America's first FISA-recognized Class A international rowing course. However, the Henley Course - site of this week's 92nd Royal Canadian Henley Regatta - is no longer alone.

The year after the revamped Henley Course was unveiled for the North American Rowing Championships in 1967, Mexico completed its famed Xochimilco Course for the 1968 Olympics. Then came the new Cooper River layout at Camden, N.J., and the Aldridge Smith Course

nearing completion at Princeton.

And just in case you've forgotten, Jack Sulger's fine layout at Pelham Manor on the outskirts of New York City is only a tide level away from FISA recognition. If they could find some way to control the tidal rise and fall to allow competition without having to rely on tide tables, the New York Athletic Club would have itself a rowing course second to none.

But now Canada has a second FISA-standards rowing layout which rivals anything

anywhere in the world.

It is the new Burnaby Lake Course where some \$350,000 was expended to create a competition site for the 1973 Canada Games and give the west coast a sheltered 2000-metre rowing and paddling centre which ranks alongside the best there are.

Oarsmen and officials involved with the Canada Games competitions last summer had nothing but good things to say about the British Columbia course. And this spring, after the Western Sprints for university crews were staged there, the American crews went home raving about the facilities and that traditional Western Canadian hospitality.

"The finest racing course in the western hemisphere," was the way University of Washington coach Dick Erickson put it. "It's equalled only by Munich and Lucerne."

Here's what Dan Levin, writing in Sports Illustrated, had to say about the new Burnaby layout upon his return from the Western Sprints:

"Lily pads still fringe Burnaby's edges, and the lake resembles nothing more than a darkwater bass pond, a very small one. At its deepest it is only 14 feet; it is not even two miles long, and the open water portion cannot be more than 500 yards wide. But all these are good things. Burnaby is so narrow that last weekend when gusts of wind hit the trees on one side they blew to the other before hitting the water, and the pads smothered any chop that threatened to form.

"At each end of the 2,000-metre course six sets of pilings had been driven 90 feet into the muddy bottom, with cables running the length of the course connecting them underwater. All the buoys marking the lanes are on vertical lines attached to the cables. In this setup there are

no horizontal lines at the surface for oars or boats to tangle with.

"On the starting line at Burnaby Lake six aluminum structures rise three feet above the water, each supporting what looks like a diving board. A small boy lies on each board and holds onto the stern of the shell. Above him in an official's tower someone asks through loud-speakers, "Etes vous pret? Partez!" in the international racing language.

"The boys' hands loosen, the starter's flag comes down and the shells are away. They move

westward, toward the mountains of the Coastal Range, 10 thousand feet high, snow-capped, even in May. The mountains are 30 miles distant, but they all but hover over the lake's far


"It is an incongruous juxtaposition, the shells against the mountains. Ivy-covered bricks would seem more fitting. At the lake's far end, waiting, 1,500 people are on their feet in a grandstand built just for spectators at crew races. They stare down the lake at the boats, which at that angle seem hardly to be moving. The oars lift ever so slowly. The shells look like great torpid water bugs now. But as they move up the lake, they seem to pick up speed. Clack, clack, go the coxswains' blocks against the gunwales. And the crowd begins to cheer.

This idylic setting was chosen by the Canadian Association of Amateur Oarsmen for its Youth Trials two weeks ago. And early next month, they'll be rowing other trials there to determine Canada's entries at the IV World Rowing Championships in Lucerne.

It's a fabulous setup, indicative of the growth in Canadian rowing in recent years. The country can now boast of two FISA-standards rowing course with a third just around the

The contract for the excavation of the 1976 Olympic course on Isle Notre Dame at Montreal has been let. And with the FISA Youth Championships scheduled there next year, a definite deadline is set.

By next year at this time, Canada will be able to boast of three qualified international rowing layouts.



Look for a lot from this big redhead in the years to come. 

Lienert, a marine engineer, was coach of the St. Catharines, Rowing Club — one of Canada's best and most prestigious rowing clubs — for 11 years.

He was also the assistant coach of the Canadian rowing team which competed in the 1964 Olympic Games in Tokyo and head coach of the Canadian rowing contingent in the 1966 world championships in Yugoslavia and the 1968 Olympics in Mexico.

"Canada is very prominent in international rowing," Gerry says.

But one reason why rowing isn't a major sport in the Maritimes — except for the Halifax area — is because rowing has been primarily a regionalized sport in Canada. St. Catharines and Vancouver have been the traditional hotbeds of the sport in Canada.

Lienert was reared in Port Dalhousie, now a part of St. Catharines. It's in St. Catharines that the Royal Canadian Henley Regatta is held every year and exposure to this annual event attracts a great deal of local attention in St. Catharines to rowing.

"Every kid in the area tries rowing," Lienert says. "They naturally fall into it."

Lienert himself is an 11-year veteran of rowing competitions.

Not only does St. Catharines have the St. Catharines Rowing Club going for it, it also has Ridley Graduate Boat Club and Ridley College is gaining prominence as one of the nation's major clubs.

While St. Catharines has tradition going for it, Vancouver has favorable weather conditions and natural facilities for water sports as its main advantages.

However, Lienert says that the federal government's Sport Canada organization, through the Canadian Association of Amateur Oarsmen, is attempting to decentralize the sport from the Vancouver and St. Catharines areas.

"There's financial assistance available to compete at the national level," he says. But, he cautions, "we shouldn't apply for it until we're ready."

For competitors to reach this level of competition requires a great deal of stamina and discipline. Like any sport, the individual must be prepared to practise, compete, practise and compete.

To produce national contenders and Olympic prospects, Lienert says, he needs two things: a volume of personnel and personnel of the right size.

Rowing is primarily a big man's sport and the main prerequisite is strength. "I'm talking about guys six-foot-four, six-foot-five, 200 pounds and up," Lienart says.

He says there are lots of rowing prospects in the area. "I see many strong young fellows walking around the city who meet the basic requirements. To develop from there is a matter of practise and conditioning."

The Kennebecasis Rowing Club is the only one of its kind in the province, Lienert says, and it's hard to motivate individuals to take an avid interest in the sport.





This will be the second time Lucerne has played host to the Worlds on the Rotsee, that slender finger of a lake in the foreground. The first championship was held there in 1962, then went to Bled, Yugoslavia in 1966 and was held here in St. Catharines four years ago. The women's section will be rowed August 29-September 1 at Lucerne with the men's championship to follow September 4-8.

This statue of William Hamilton Merritt was erected by the citizens of St. Catharines in tribute to the significant contribution he made toward Canada's development, not the least of which was the construction of the First Welland Canal, a portion of which is now the Henley Course upon which this week's 92nd Royal Canadian Henley Regatta is taking place. Without him, the Henley might have only been a dream. This year marks the 150th anniversary of the start on that first canal and St. Catharines' most famous son is being recognized in a variety of ways, not the least of which is a special postage stamp in his honor. And at this Henley, the Dominion Marine Association is putting into competition the William Hamilton Merritt Trophy for Senior Pairs to tie the famous canal builder and rowing — which owes so much to him — together in some tangible way. The Dominion Marine Association, with a membership of 19 shipping lines and 143 ships, was founded in 1903, the same year the first Henley was rowed here on what was then still the Old Welland Canal.

The club, although still in its infancy, is in good shape financially. It's financed primarily through private donations at present. "It's remarkable how much backing the club gets from voluntary donations," Lienert remarks. "We also hold the odd raffle and dance."

Lienert credits much of ther club's success in this respect to the labors of Dr. C.H. Bonnycastle, the club's regatta committee chairman. Each year the regatta has grown.

However, the main difficulty for the Kennebecasis Rowing Club is to motivate individuals. It's difficult to get people to train properly for the sport, Lienert says.

The actual rowing season is just part of the training schedule, Gerry notes. To become a good oarsman, an individual must be willing to undergo a program of weight training, running and swimming during the winter to keep the muscles in flux.

Lienert says he isn't interested in developing a social club, only a competitive rowing club.

"There's money available in Sport Canada to develop and push the right rowers right to the top. For those who take an interest, the individual will go as far as he can."

Lienert says he has a "pipeline" to the St. Catharines clubs, as a result of his long association there. If he corrals a hot prospect here, he could arrange for him to go to St. Catharines for training. There an oarsman would be exposed to interclub, local, provincial and national rowing competitions.

Boats and ships have played a big part in the life of the ruggedly-built 46-year-old Lienert. Besides being involved in rowing regattas, he has also travelled a good portion of the world thanks to his profession of marine engineering.

He worked in Idonesia and in Europe before arriving in Saint John where he is now employed with the Saint John Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Company Limited.

What drives him to continue devoting his time to rowing?

Replies Gerry: "There's something about watching a racing shell that's poetry in motion. I'm like any athlete. If he likes a sport, he's got to come back to it."

"However, from a mental standpoint, I find coaching much harder than being in a boat."

He said he finds Saint John a frustrating city as far as sports is concerned. "In sport, there's a tremendous inferiority complex here — the whole mentality is parochial.

"It aggravates me to see the potential manpower here, but you can't get them involved in sport. I see good talent sitting in a pub, getting fat and killing themselves on booze."






